Flocks of sheep grazed near creeks and rivers which supplied water to Indigenous communities. When sheep drank from the creeks and rivers they fouled the water with dung and eroded the riverbeds.	
	Many Aboriginal people became incredibly sick and died due to their lack of immunity.
Native plants were cleared to make way for introduced species of flora.
